Flanigan nominated Vice-Chair Hancock to continue to serve as vice-chair for 2018-19, and Gurka seconded the nomination. There were no other nominations. **Hancock was unanimously re-elected as Vice-Chair.**

e. Essential Learning Changes from the Essential Learning Subcommittee

In lieu of minutes for the year, the Essential Learning subcommittee submitted a summary of changes discussed and approved for implementation in 2018-19. This list is presented on page 107. The changes to gtPathways designations is strictly informational. Flanigan motioned to approve the Essential Learning changes, and McKenney seconded the motion. The Essential Learning Changes were unanimously approved.

A. Clarification of Prefix Character Count Requirement (p. 11)

III. Policies Pertaining to Course Additions, Deletions, and Modifications

A. Course Numbering

- 1. Course Prefix
 - a. The course prefix is determined by the department and approved by the appropriate curriculum committee. A prefix should be four characters and should be as closely related to the department or subject matter as possible. More than one prefix may be associated with courses in a department.

Decision:

• Change "should" to "must" to make it clear that prefixes with either fewer or more than four characters are not allowed.

B. Clarification of the BS Requirements (p. 23)

- Requirements beyond Essential Learning.
- Prescription of Essential Learning courses.
- 2. Degree Categories for Bachelor Programs. The baccalaureate degrees offered at Colorado Mesa University can be categorized into six distinct categories as are described below. Whenever a new degree program is proposed to the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, the degree will be determined to be a part of a category based on the category description and will then be required to adhere to the category requirements.
 - a. Category 1: Bachelor of Science
 - 1. Description: The Bachelor of Science degree is designed to give the student a strong technical background with an emphasis on math and science, which results in a more concentrated major and a firm foundation for highly technical graduate programs.
 - 2. Category Requirements: A degree in this category will include 3 credit hours of mathematics or statistics or computer science beyond the Essential Learning requirement. Essential Learning cannot be prescribed for majors in this category.

Decision:

• Changes for the catalog approved by the Faculty Senate Policy Committee will be matched in handbook.



C. Clearer Terminology for Hybrid Courses (pp. 17 & 19)

I. Alternative Delivery and Hybrid Courses

A curriculum committee does not approve the method of delivery of courses. However, any courses which are offered in an alternative delivery manner are expected to include the same degree of rigor as courses taught using traditional methods. Furthermore, any proposals for courses or programs which are intended solely or primarily for alternative delivery must be approved by the appropriate curriculum committee to ensure the academic rigor of the course is consistent with the University's traditional offerings. Such courses and programs will be subject to the same University credit hour, student learning objectives, and assessment policies as all other courses and programs.

A hybrid course is one that includes a mixture of course types from Table III.2 and/or delivery modes. Such courses and programs will be subject to the same University credit hour, student learning objectives, and assessment policies as all other courses and programs. The syllabus must indicate how the mixture of course types contributes to satisfy the credit hours policy minimum minutes.

Discussion:

• For proposers wanting to create a class that combines two instruction methods not otherwise combined in Table III-2, there has been confusion about the ability to use the Hybrid designation as this now commonly refers to courses in which online and in-classroom instruction are combined. The addition of a second term will clarify a course's eligibility for this designation when combined instruction methods will be employed.

Decision:

- Add Mixed Instruction Method to the table on page 17 with the current description used for Hybrid.
- Add description of hybrid as online/in-classroom course in the table. The current description will be retained in reference to Mixed Instruction Method courses.
- The first sentence of the second paragraph of the description on page 19, section III.I will be modified to state "A Hybrid course is one that includes a mixture of online and in-classroom instruction, and a Mixed Instruction Method course is one that includes a mixture of course types from Table III-2 and/or delivery modes." The rest of the section will remain unchanged.

C. Essential Learning Requirement and Degree Categories

(Note: "Degree Distinction" has been superseded by the Degree Category policies, described below, by action of Faculty Senate on April 2, 2009.)

1. Essential Learning Requirement for Bachelor, Associate of Arts and Associate of Science Programs. Each student shall complete the minimum semester credit hour Essential Learning program as specified by the Colorado Mesa University faculty. The English requirement may be specified at the college level. The Mathematics requirement may be specified at the program level. Any college-wide Essential Learning requirements in a student's primary discipline area will be replaced with a requirement for Essential Learning electives from other disciplines. Otherwise, students should be allowed to select their Essential Learning courses from the designated list according to their own preferences, except as provided in Section IV.C.2.c.2.

E. Bachelor of Applied Science

The following conditions exist for the Bachelor of Applied Science (BAS) degree and must be specified on the program sheet.

- 1. To be admitted to the BAS, a student must have earned an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree. Thirty-six (36) hours from the technical coursework of that AAS degree transfer into the BAS as a block of courses. Other associates degrees can be considered if they are judged to be equivalent to an AAS. Conditional admission may be granted to a student who is in the process of completing an AAS.
- 2. The BAS degree must contain at least 33 hours of upper division courses.
- 3. The BAS degree must contain the College's prescribed Essential Learning program. Essential Learning courses may be transferred into the College.

G. Certificate Programs

Departments may propose creation, modification or deletion of certificate programs, which do not need to include the College's Essential Learning requirements. Certificate programs specify fields of study rather than majors. Certificate programs contain 5-59 semester credit hours. Proposals for Certificates follow the same guidelines as for degree programs. CMU recognizes the following types of Certificates:

• Change instances of "College" to "University" or "Department" as appropriate.

F. Improvement of Catalog Description Requirements (p. 12-13)

B. Catalog Description

1. The respective curriculum committee requires that authors receive feedback from the committee's Catalog Description Evaluator before submitting a proposal for a new course or modifying the description of an existing course. Please submit your proposed description via e-mail or campus mail to the Catalog Description Evaluator by the published deadlines.

2. Guidelines:

- a. Descriptions do not need to be furnished for reserve-numbered courses (i.e., Independent Study, Topics)
- b. Course descriptions should always begin with a noun or noun phrase. Ex: "Exploration of..."; "Approaches to..."; "Ecological development of..."
- c. Descriptions should not exceed 60 words and in most cases should be much shorter than that.
- d. Descriptions should offer only the most basic information about the course's content. Unless it is part of the fabric of the course, it is unnecessary to provide information about grading procedures, pedagogical approaches, or other information about the structure and style of the course.
- e. The first sentence will always be a fragment. Authors may use their own discretion in deciding whether later sentences are complete or fragments.
- f. Prerequisites, co-requisites, and semester of offer are not part of the description, but should be provided to the Committee in a proposal for a new course.



Decision:

- Add a new rule that "Sequential courses with identical names and/or descriptions are not allowed."
- State that "Prerequisites and co-requisites are not to be included in the course description."
- State that "Descriptions do not need to include descriptions of classroom hours, such as stating that there are '2 hours of classroom instruction and one hour of lab instruction per week.' If this is included, it is part of the 60-word limit."
- Provide better examples of course description. Emily Dodson will have the new examples approved by Johanna Varner, the Catalog Description Reviewer, before making the edit.

G. PTO Program Requirement Exception Procedures (p. 25)

4. Category Requirements: All PTO programs that are designed as BS or BA, or based on the framework of a BS or BA, will follow the category requirements unless they have applied to and received approval from the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee for an exception. Essential Learning cannot be prescribed in this category unless the program has received such an exception.

Programs will be granted exceptions to the category requirements (i.e.: prescribed Essential Learning and/or deletion of language or math/stats requirement) only in cases where they cannot otherwise meet the requirements or recommendations of the nationally recognized accrediting, licensing, certifying, or professional organization referenced above within 60 credit hours.

All AAS, BAS, BBA, BFA, and BSN programs will be considered PTO Programs.

The following programs have also been approved by the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee for PTO status on the indicated dates:

- BS in Accounting, September 24, 2009
- BS in Computer Information Systems, September 24, 2009
- BS in Athletic Training, January 28, 2010
- All Teacher Education bachelor programs, January 28, 2010
- BS in Construction Management, April 8, 2010
- BSW in Social Work, September 26, 2013
- BS in Mechanical Engineering Technology, February 27, 2014
- BM in Music Business and Entrepreneurship, March 10, 2016
- BM in Music Performance, March 10, 2016
- BME in Music Education K-12, March 10, 2016.

The number of hours required for a major in a PTO degree may exceed 60 hours when verified by the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee to be necessary to meet degree requirements which are set by the identified accrediting, licensing, certifying, or professional organization.



Decisions:

- The committee reviewed and approved A PTO Curricular Exceptions form. When a program modification is prepared, proposers will be asked "Do any of the proposed changes require approval of an exception to degree requirements per the program's current PTO designation, or is there a need to now request PTO designation and/or accompanying degree requirement exceptions? Refer to section C.2.f.4 of the Curriculum Policies and Procedures Manual for more details if there is question as to whether this is the case." If the proposer selects "Yes," he or she will be instructed to complete the PTO Curricular Exceptions form. This form is included at the end of this document.
- The title BM in Music Business and Entrepreneurship needs to be corrected. It should read BM in Music with Elective Studies in Business.
- The BSRS, Radiologic Science needs to be added to this list (approved 1/26/17).
- Athletic Training needs deleted as the program itself has been officially deleted.
- The list of PTO approved programs will be revised to indicate which degree structure on which they are designed. Refer to Section I in this document for more details.

H. Credit Hours Limits and Foundation Courses (pp. 25 & 32)

4. Category Requirements: All PTO programs that are designed as BS or BA, or based on the framework of a BS or BA, will follow the category requirements unless they have applied to and received approval from the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee for an exception. Essential Learning cannot be prescribed in this category unless the program has received such an exception.

Programs will be granted exceptions to the category requirements (i.e.: prescribed Essential Learning and/or deletion of language or math/stats requirement) only in cases where they cannot otherwise meet the requirements or recommendations of the nationally recognized accrediting, licensing, certifying, or professional organization referenced above within 60 credit hours.

The number of hours required for a major in a PTO degree may exceed 60 hours when verified by the Undergraduate Curriculum Committee to be necessary to meet degree requirements which are set by the identified accrediting, licensing, certifying, or professional organization.

M. Foundation Courses

All bachelors programs except the BAS will include a category for Foundation Courses. Foundation courses are 100 and 200 level supporting or departmental courses identified by the host department to help the student with an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree to complete the Bachelors degree with an additional 60 hours and within 2 years. The foundation courses will include the corresponding courses identified in the transfer agreement for that degree program. Additional foundation courses may be included that are not on the transfer agreement.



Discussion:

• This section needs to be reviewed and possibly clarified. This will allow for clearer communication about credit limits in each section as well as how Foundation Courses fit into this scheme.

Decision:

• Table for further discussion if deemed necessary.

- a. Bachelor's degrees with descriptions:
 - i. BS
 - ii. BA
 - iii. BSW PTO program. Refer readers to the descriptions and indicate BS as base degree type.
 - iv. BM PTO program. Refer readers to the descriptions and determine base degree type prior to publication.
 - v. BME PTO PTO program. Refer readers to the descriptions and determine base degree type prior to publication.
- **b.** Bachelor's degrees without descriptions:
 - i. BAS Refer readers to section IV.E (p. 26), the description of BAS.
 - ii. BBA Based on BS Confirm BS designation before publication.
 - iii. BFA Based on BA
 - iv. BSN Based on BS
 - v. BSRS Based on BS

Decision:

- The list of PTO designated degrees will be modified, dividing the list into sections that indicate the
 degree type upon which each degree is based. The designations indicated above in red will be used
 to divide these.
 - Should the base degree type not be determined prior to publication, the committee will review the programs and assign base degree types at the next meeting. In this scenario, the listing of these programs will be prefaced with "Base degree designation has not yet been determined. Once determined, an amended version of this manual will be republished in which base degree type will be indicated."



J. Modification of PTO program on modification of program to become PTO (p. 32)

- f. If the program is already a PTO Program with 60 or more hours in the major and the modifications cause the number of hours in the major to increase, OR if the program is a B.A. or B.S. and the modifications cause the hours in the major to exceed 60 (which constitutes an application for moving the program to PTO category), the justification must include:
 - (1) Rationale for the move to the PTO category.
 - (2) Statement as to how the curriculum aligns to the requirements or recommendations of the nationally recognized accrediting, licensing, certifying or professional organization.
 - (3) Rationale for the program to exceed 60 credit hours, if applicable.
 - (4) Rationale for prescribing Essential Learning courses, if applicable.
 - (5) Explanation as to how a transfer student with an AA degree in the discipline of that program can graduate by completing only an additional 60 hours.

Decision:

- Need to clarify that these items need to be addressed for instances where an exception to Essential Learning or program-specific requirements is requested. Revised text:
 - o "If the program is already a PTO Program with 60 or more hours in the major and the modifications cause the number of hours in the major to increase, the program is already a PTO program and proposed modifications require an exception to Essential Learning or program-specific requirements for the given major type, OR the program is a B.A. or B.S. and the modifications cause the hours in the major to exceed 60 (which constitutes an application for moving the program to PTO category), the justification must include:"

K. Other Items Identified

Item and Decision:

- Page 17, Table III-2
 - o Preparation minutes for Music: Private Instruction may be off by 50 minutes. While other course types' engagement and preparation minutes add up to 2,250 minutes per credit hour, this one only adds up to 2,200 minutes per credit hour. If this is found to be a typo after further investigation by Academic Affairs, this will be corrected. If not, it will stand as is.

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning

courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to understand and fulfill the requirements for her/his intended degree(s).

DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.
- Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans.
- Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought.

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 120 semester hours minimum.

Justification:

The proposed program modification will address the skills that are needed for musicians in the twenty-first century and will improve the experience and preparation for the student. The department has decided the degree program needed to be revised the program to have: stronger performance skills, increased amount of technology content, and a better way to provide courses to teach pedagogy and improvisation.

In addition to the current capstone recital, a music performance major will develop a digital portfolio that includes a website, audio/video recordings, resume, syllibi for future teaching, etc. These elements will be taught in the existing courses and the "Advanced Music Technology" course that will be added to the program.

In order to ensure that the student has strong performance skills, the required number of lesson credits have been increased from 1 to 2 credits to accommodate hour-per-week lessons for eight semesters. This is reflected on the Music Performance Degree program sheet; all the elective lesson options (MUSL 3__ and MUSL4__) under the keyboard section have been removed, as these are now required within the Music Core.

For better hands-on knowledge and skills, "Orchestration" will be replaced with the newly added "Applied Orchestration and Arranging" course.

The new Instrumental Pedagogy and Literature course will allow instrumental music performance majors to receive the information and skills specific to their instrument, augmenting their knowledge of teaching pedagogy and literature that they can use in both their own playing and in their private teaching. This new course will also allow students to focus more specifically on literature for their instruments. Lastly, delivering pedagogy and literature in this manner will better allow the Music Department to meet the accreditation standards as set forth by the National Association of Schools of Music.

The student will now learn improvisational skills in both "Introduction to Improvisation" and "Beginning Jazz Improvisation" to fulfill necessary applicable NASM standards, and to address a deficiency in the current curriculum concerning musical improvisation.

These courses develop the student's abilities and prepare them to perform in a plethora of venues and genres such as symphony orchestras, chamber ensembles, armed forces ensembles, musical theaters, opera, and countless entertainment venues. As a musician in the 21st Century, this degree also seeks to create excellent performers who "create their own future-and not simply enter a future that's been created for them." A second goal of this This program is towill train musicians with current professional skills so they have the ability to make their own opportunities, shape their careers like entrepreneurs, produce their own performances, collaborate with artists from other genres and art forms and perform at a high artistic level. - 3. Demonstrate the fundamentals of pedagogy on the student's major instrument (Specialized Knowledge/Applied Learning)

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.
- Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans.
- Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought.

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- The Catalog Year determines which program sheet and degree requirements a student must fulfill in order to graduate.

	In addition to the current capstone recital, a music performance major will develop a digital portfolio that includes a website, audio/video recordings, resume, syllubi for future teaching, etc. These elements will be taught in the existing courses and "Advanced Music Technology" course that will be added to the program.
	In order to ensure that the student has strong performance skills, the required number of lesson credits have been increased from 1 to 2 credits to accommodate hour-per-week lessons for eight semesters. This is reflected on the Music Performance Degree program sheet; all the elective lesson options (MUSL 3 and MUSL4) under the keyboard section have been removed, as these are now required within the Music Core. This program will train musicians with professional skills to make their own opportunities, shape their careers like entrepreneurs, produce their own performances, collaborate with artists from other genres and art forms and perform at a high artistic level. Training in the following areas will assist performers to create a meaningful career in music: identifying entrepreneurial opportunities in music and the creative sector, interdisciplinary collaborations, e-marketing your music, creating an artist's digital portfolio, video marketing, and independent business website.

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to understand and fulfill the requirements for her/his intended degree(s).

DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.

 Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans. Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought. Submission deadlines and commencement details can be found at http://www.coloradomesa.edu/registrar/graduation.html. 	
If a student's petition for graduation is denied, it will be her/his responsibility to consult the Registrar's Office regarding next steps.	

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 120 semester hours minimum.
- Students must complete a minimum of 30 of the last 60 hours of credit at CMU, with at least 15 semester hours in major discipline courses numbered 300 or higher.
- 40 upper-division credits (an alternative credit limit applies to the Bachelor of Applied Science degree).
- 2.00 cumulative GPA or higher in all CMU coursework.
- A course may only be used to fulfill one requirement for each degree/certificate.
- No more than six semester hours of independent study courses can be used toward the degree.
- Non-traditional credit, such as advanced placement, credit by examination, credit for prior learning, cooperative education and internships, cannot exceed 30 semester credit hours for a baccalaureate degree; A maximum of 15 of the 30 credits may be for cooperative education, internships, and practica.
- Pre-collegiate courses (usually numbered below 100) cannot be used for graduation.
- Capstone exit assessment/projects (e.g., Major Field Achievement Test) requirements are identified under Program-Specific Degree Requirements.
- The Catalog Year determines which program sheet and degree requirements a student must fulfill in order to graduate.

Justification:

The proposed program modification will address the skills that are needed for musicians in the twenty-first century and will improve the experience and preparation for the student. The department has decided the degree program needed to be revised the program to have: stronger performance skills, increased amount of technology contents, and better way to provide courses to teach pedagogy and improvisation.

In addition to the current capstone recital, a music performance major will develop a degital portfolio that includes a website, audio/video recordings, resume, syllubi for future teaching, etc. These elements will be taught in the existing courses and "Advanced Music Technology" course that will be added to the program.

In order to ensure that the student has strong performance skills, the required number of lesson credits are increased to accommodate hour-per-week lessons for eight semesters.

For better hands-on knowledge and skills, "Orchestration" will be replaced with the newly added "Applied Orchestration and Arranging" course.

Students will have the option to register for either MUSL 337 and MUSL 437 (classical voice study) or an alternative 300 and 400 level lesson class.

The student will now learn improvisational skills in both MUSA 258 Introduction to Improvisation and MUSA 268 Beginning Jazz Improvisation to fulfill necessary applicable NASM standards, and to address a deficiency in the current curriculum concerning musical improvisation.

The old Diction sequence was patched together in a way that was not conducive to the students retaining all of the information that they need to be effective, professional level singers. The second semester of Foreign Language was deemed unnecessary to the specialized educational needs of a music performer. The National Association of Schools of Music specifies no requirement other than the statement: "Studies in foreign languages are essential for students majoring in voice performance"

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to understand and fulfill the requirements for her/his intended degree(s).

DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.

 Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans. Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought. If a student's petition for graduation is denied, it will be her/his responsibility to consult the Registrar's Office regarding next steps.	

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 120 semester hours minimum.



Justification:

These proposed changes apply only to vocal majors in the BME program. They address the nature of the delivery of content so as to make the professional preparation more comprehensive. They do not significantly alter the overall program characteristics.

A deficiency in Vocal Music Education majors' curriculum was identified in that they were taking numerous instrumental pedagogy courses, but no Vocal Pedagogy course to learn how to teach their own instrument effectively. Opera Workshop was also deemed necessary for these majors to have some amount of stage and acting experience, as many of them will go on to be directors of school plays and musicals. The deletion of two instrumental pedagogy courses was done to allow for the necessary credits to allow these course additions.

The restructuring of the Diction sequence was done to maximize the absorption of large quantities of information over the course of two semesters, rather than attempting to cram it all into one, as has been the case up until now. Since the new courses will be a lecture/lab combination with more student handson participation, this change is credit-neutral.

A new SLO is included which is simply an update as a result of a regular annual review internal to the

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.
- Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans.
- Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought.

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 120 semester hours minimum.
- Students must complete a minimum of 30 of the last 60 hours of credit at CMU, with at least 15 semester hours in major discipline courses numbered 300 or higher.
- 40 upper-division credits (an alternative credit limit applies to the Bachelor of Applied Science degree).
- 2.00 cumulative GPA or higher in all CMU coursework.
- A course may only be used to fulfill one requirement for each degree/certificate.
- No more than six semester hours of independent study courses can be used toward the degree.
- Non-traditional credit, such as advanced placement, credit by examination, credit for prior learning, cooperative education
 and internships, cannot exceed 30 semester credit hours for a baccalaureate degree; A maximum of 15 of the 30 credits
 may be for cooperative education, internships, and practica.
- Pre-collegiate courses (usually numbered below 100) cannot be used for graduation.
- Capstone exit assessment/projects (e.g., Major Field Achievement Test) requirements are identified under Program-Specific Degree Requirements.
- The Catalog Year determines which program sheet and degree requirements a student must fulfill in order to graduate.



The Music Education K-12 degree provides students with the knowledge, skills, and musicianship to become a successful music educator. Studies in music theory, history, literature, ensemble performance, and applied study give the student a strong foundation on which to build a successful teaching career. Classes in conducting, instrumental, choral, and elementary techniques develop the skills and knowledge needed for a rewarding career as a K-12 educator. These skills and knowledge are applied during field experiences as well as during the student teaching internship.

As a student, you will gradually accumulate over 200 hours of classroom experience before beginning student teaching. School districts throughout western Colorado provide opportunities to gain experience with children of all ages and backgrounds in a variety of school settings.

A minimum of 75 credit hours of Essential Learning and content area coursework must be completed with a minimum GPA of 2.80 before a candidate may apply for admission to the Center for Teacher Education secondary licensure program. - 8. Apply Music content knowledge while working with learners to access information in real world settings assuring learner mastery of the content (Specialized Knowledge).
- 9. Integrate assessment, planning, and instructional strategies in a coordinated and engaging way through multiple means of communication (Critical Thinking).
- 10. Engage in meaningful and intensive professional learning and self-renewal by regularly examining practice through ongoing study, self-reflection, and collaboration (Applied Learning).

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to understand and fulfill the requirements for her/his intended degree(s).

DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.

- Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans.
- Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought.

If a student's petition for graduation is denied, it will be her/his responsibility to consult the Registrar's Office regarding next steps.

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU baccalaureate degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 120 semester hours minimum.
- Students must complete a minimum of 30 of the last 60 hours of credit at CMU, with at least 15 semester hours in major discipline courses numbered 300 or higher.
- 40 upper-division credits (an alternative credit limit applies to the Bachelor of Applied Science degree).
- 2.00 cumulative GPA or higher in all CMU coursework.
- A course may only be used to fulfill one requirement for each degree/certificate.
- No more than six semester hours of independent study courses can be used toward the degree.
- Non-traditional credit, such as advanced placement, credit by examination, credit for prior learning, cooperative education and internships, cannot exceed 30 semester credit hours for a baccalaureate degree; A maximum of 15 of the 30 credits may be for cooperative education, internships, and practica.
- Pre-collegiate courses (usually numbered below 100) cannot be used for graduation.
- Capstone exit assessment/projects (e.g., Major Field Achievement Test) requirements are identified under Program-Specific Degree Requirements.
- The Catalog Year determines which program sheet and degree requirements a student must fulfill in order to graduate. Visit with your advisor or academic department to determine which catalog year and program requirements you should follow.

Advising Process and DegreeWorks

This document is intended for informational purposes to help determine what courses and associated requirements are needed to earn a degree. The suggested course sequencing outlines how students could finish degree requirements. Some courses are critical to complete in specific semesters, while others may be moved around. Meeting with an academic advisor is essential in planning courses and altering the suggested course sequencing. It is ultimately the student's responsibility to understand and fulfill the requirements for her/his intended degree(s).

DegreeWorks is an online degree audit tool available in MAVzone. It is the official record used by the Registrar's Office to evaluate progress towards a degree and determine eligibility for graduation. Students are responsible for reviewing their DegreeWorks audit on a regular basis and should discuss questions or concerns with their advisor or academic department head. Discrepancies in requirements should be reported to the Registrar's Office.

Graduation Process

Students must complete the following in the first two months of the semester prior to completing their degree requirements:

- Review their DegreeWorks audit and create a plan that outlines how unmet requirements will be met in the final semester.
- Meet with their advisor and modify their plan as needed. The advisor must approve the final plan.
- Submit the "Intent to Graduate" form to the Registrar's Office to officially declare the intended graduation date and commencement ceremony plans.
- Register for all needed courses and complete all requirements for each degree sought.

If a student's petition for graduation is denied, it will be her/his responsibility to consult the Registrar's Office regarding next steps.

INSTITUTIONAL DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

The following institutional degree requirements apply to all CMU/WCCC AAS degrees. Specific programs may have different requirements that must be met in addition to institutional requirements.

- 60 semester hours minimum.
- Students must complete a minimum of 15 of the final 30 semester hours of credit at CMU/WCCC.
- 2.00 cumulative GPA or higher in all CMU/WCCC coursework.
- A course may only be used to fulfill one requirement for each degree/certificate.
- No more than six semester hours of independent study courses can be used toward the degree.
- Non-traditional credit, such as advanced placement, credit by examination, credit for prior learning, cooperative education and internships, cannot exceed 20 semester credit hours for an AAS degree.
- Pre-collegiate courses (usually numbered below 100) cannot be used for graduation.
- Capstone exit assessment/projects (e.g., Major Field Achievement Test) requirements are identified under Program-Specific Degree Requirements.
- The Catalog Year determines which program sheet and degree requirements a student must fulfill in order to graduate. Visit with your advisor or academic department to determine which catalog year and program requirements you should follow.
- See "Requirements for Undergraduate Degrees and Certificates" in the catalog for a complete list of graduation requirements.
