Grand Junction, CO - Celebrity art historian Lee Sandstead is coming to Mesa State College on November 17. He will discuss his new TV show, "Art Attack with Lee Sandstead," which airs on the Travel Channel on November 30.

The show features him traveling the world with a camera crew discussing his highly-contagious love for art. He has already filmed at eight locations throughout the United States and, at each venue, discusses interesting facets of five artworks. Part art history and part motivation, come to this illustrated lecture to hear how Sandstead was discovered by the Travel Channel, what they were looking for, and some of the artworks that were in the first episode. And just like the title of his TV show expresses, this presentation is one heck of a ride.
