

**TRANSFER AGREEMENT  
BETWEEN  
COLORADO MOUNTAIN COLLEGE  
AND  
MESA STATE COLLEGE**

Colorado Mountain College (CMC) and Mesa State College (MSC) hereby enter into the following agreement to co-develop and adopt public policy statements governing transfer between the Associate of General Studies degree in Criminal Justice offered at Colorado Mountain College and the Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice degree offered at Mesa State College. This public policy statement shall be known as the Transfer Agreement. This agreement follows established CCHE policy on the acceptance of Colorado state guaranteed transfer general education courses. Additional course acceptance determination is depicted in Section II. Students applying under this agreement will still need to meet minimum Mesa State College application requirements and will follow all application procedures as outlined in the Mesa State College catalog. Any additional requirements specific to the degree program here listed will be addressed in the agreement. All Mesa State College academic policies will apply.

**SECTION I: ADMISSIONS CRITERIA AND PROCEDURES**

**A. MSC admission standards and criteria**

Applicants who apply for the Mesa State Baccalaureate major and concentration program as outlined in this agreement must have completed the CMC Associate of General Studies (A.G.S.) degree and must have followed the CMC degree/graduation plan included as Appendix A.

1. Applicants who have not followed the A.G.S. program as it appears in Appendix A and/or have not been awarded the A.G.S. degree are not covered under this agreement.
2. Once accepted into the baccalaureate program, students must receive a grade of 'C' or better in each required course and must maintain a 2.0 GPA overall in order to proceed to graduation.

**B. Treatment of GPA earned at CMC**

The letter grades on courses from CMC accepted for transfer by Mesa State College will appear on the Mesa State transcript as transfer grades. The grade point average earned at CMC shall be used solely for the purpose of admission to Mesa State College and to the baccalaureate program. Only the grades and credits awarded at Mesa State College will be used in calculating a student's GPA for graduation.

**C. Admission of CMC students with prior transfer credits**

Use by CMC of credit hours earned at a school other than CMC will not affect the admissibility of the student. Usage of these courses at MSC may fall under conditions depicted in Section II of this agreement.

**SECTION II: TRANSFER OF CREDIT**

**A. Admissibility of prior transfer credit courses**

Students who receive the A.G.S. degree from CMC but fulfilled some of the credit hours at a school outside of the Colorado Community College System are subject to the following conditions:

1. Transfer courses accepted by CMC toward general education are acceptable to the Mesa State College baccalaureate degree as long as the transfer institution is regionally accredited.
2. Mesa State College will reserve the right to evaluate on a course-by-course basis any CMC-accepted transfer courses for use toward portions of the baccalaureate degree requirements other than the general education portion.

**B. MSC treatment of AP exams, CLEP Scores and other non-traditional credit in transfer**

Non-traditional credits awarded by CMC may include high school Advanced Placement (AP) exams, College

Level Examination Program (CLEP) subject examinations and military credit. Credit awarded by CMC through these means may need to follow MSC established non-traditional credit policies before receiving credit toward the baccalaureate degree. The total combination of any non-traditional credit toward any Mesa State College baccalaureate degree cannot exceed 30 semester credits.

**C. Number of credit hours accepted in transfer by MSC**

A minimum of sixty-seven (67) semester credit hours will be accepted in transfer under this agreement when the student has followed the CMC program as it appears in Appendix A and been awarded the related A.G.S. degree. Students will still need to complete the number of credit hours shown in the table in Appendix B.

1. Students who may have taken CMC courses which do not apply to the A.G.S. degree program may request that additional courses be considered on a course-by-course basis.
  - a. Additional lower division transfer courses can sometimes be considered for students who declare a minor.
  - b. Students wishing to use transfer courses to meet Mesa State graduation requirements for Degree Distinction and/or Kinesiology should consult an advisor. See also Section III-A.
2. All courses considered for transfer must have been awarded a minimum letter grade of "C" or better.

**SECTION III: DEGREE/PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS**

**A. MSC policies governing General Education, Human Performance and Wellness, and Degree Distinction requirements**

1. All baccalaureate level degrees at MSC require a minimum of 31 semester credit hours of General Education distributed in seven areas.
2. The Kinesiology graduation requirement consists of three one-credit hour courses and is required in all baccalaureate degree programs.
3. The Bachelor of Arts Degree Distinction requirement is required for graduation. It consists of a minimum six credit hours of foreign language.

**B. MSC requirements for the Bachelor of Art in Criminal Justice degree program**

Full requirements for this degree program are contained in the table in Appendix B.

**C. Special considerations and uses of CMC courses by MSC toward the Bachelor of Art in Criminal Justice degree program**


1. CMC courses outside of Colorado state guaranteed transfer courses will be transferred as substituting for the Mesa State courses according to the tables in Appendix B. Course transfer acceptance decisions for courses other than Colorado state guaranteed transfer courses may apply only for purposes of this agreement.
2. Within the CMC AGS general education core, students may take SPE 115 or SPE 125 Interpersonal Communication. The selected speech course will transfer to MSC and satisfy the required Applied Studies general education area.
3. CMC AGS students may take a two-semester (6 semester hour) sequence of a foreign language within the Arts & Humanities category. The selected foreign language two-semester sequence will transfer to MSC as the 6 semester hours for the BA degree distinction.




**A. Term of articulation agreement**


This articulation agreement shall become effective August 31, 2007 and shall remain in force for a period of five (5) years or until such time as institutional policies require modification of the agreement.




